# ARTIST IN THE **SPOTLIGHT**

Music and faith have always been entwined for our volunteer Orchestra Conductor. Humberto Vargas Herrera came to faith after the church choir in Mexico sang "My

Tribute". He was 15 years old, hearing what Jesus did on the cross for him. "It's curious," he says, "I couldn't resist, but go to Him and say, 'Lord I want to accept you. Please transform my life, make all things different.""

While attaining his bachelor's degree in Electronics Engineering, he sang in the church choir and began to conduct, "without knowledge, by ear," he said, "Because I liked to do it." He then auditioned for the National School of Music in Mexico City. As he prepared, he promised the Lord he would dedicate the music first to Him. He was accepted to study Bassoon, but due to a school strike, was unable to complete his degree. He continued working as an Engineer, "Because you have to eat!"

Still, his heart longed for music. Through a series of miracles, he was accepted to a Master's in Conducting in Montreal. Humberto recounts, "The Lord opened the door like only He can." Getting his Masters was like preparing for the Olympics; training with world-renowned Maestros, learning instruments and new compositions every day, even traveling to Europe and the USA to conduct. Humberto is deeply thankful and feels the Lord gave him this talent so that he can do more for God. "The talent comes from God, not from yourself. It is to serve and share; not to be pretentious."

While conducting is wonderful, it only pays well in big orchestras, so to make a living, he relies on the other talent God gave him: Engineering. He worked 12 years in Montreal before transitioning to Shaw Communications in Calgary. Once here, he felt drawn to First Alliance Church. Though he wanted to use his musical gifts, "You don't just come and start conducting, you have to serve in other ways". So the Lord opened the door to sing in the choir.

After music pastor, David Klob, got to know Humberto's skill and heart, he invited him to conduct the orchestra beginning September 2014 (pictured above, left). Humberto prepared the orchestra for the Paul Baloche concert in December. "Though I didn't conduct in the concert; it was worth it to wait for God's time to conduct later. The blessing comes from putting Him in first place."

"There is a temptation," Humberto says, "to receive applause and honor for oneself. I ask the congregation to please pray my heart never goes in that way; the honor and glory belongs only to God." Of course, it is very important to be well-trained, skillful musicians. "We are to be perfect as He is perfect — with God's help."

"The music itself is just a tool," Humberto concludes. "It increases our receptivity to the message of Christ." As we worship God in spirit and truth through the music, the Holy Spirit moves and miracles happen.

#### wenty-one year old Jessica Ward heard the call clearly on the morning of August 28.

That weekend at FAC her friend, Sara Apostoaei, shared her own journey with the congregation. She related how she had been praying for some time for God to speak to her about His will for her future and for Him to open her eyes to what hurt Him the most – to break her heart for what breaks His. Over time, she became aware of the worldwide crisis in human trafficking and had an overwhelming sadness and sense of helplessness for entrapped women and children. Shortly after, a lawyer working with International Justice Mission spoke at FAC, telling of the inroads he and other legal counsel had been having in breaking this chain of slavery. Suddenly, Sara's eyes were opened, her prayer answered, her calling made clear. A plan to become a lawyer to fight the injustices of slavery was put into place.

**Jessica, listening to Sara's story, was awestruck.** What did God want her to do? What could she do? She had been working to support herself financially since the age of eighteen. She was employed in a place she called 'spiritually draining,' where the dollar and power were paramount, but which provided the monetary security she craved. She, too, had been praying for God's will to be made known to her, but she felt handicapped by her circumstances. Having just returned from her second mission trip to Belarus,



Jessica found her heart for outreach was awakened and she was fully alive when ministering to others. She had difficulty reconciling the contrast as she returned to her workplace.

As she listened to Sara's story, a passion began to stir in her heart. Inspired, she left the church that Sunday morning, secured a student loan from the bank by the afternoon, and was registered in the Faculty of Theology at Ambrose University by Monday morning. She had sent a letter of resignation to her employer the evening before, facing her greatest stronghold and stepping out in faith to follow Jesus. Jessica had clearly heard the call to a life in ministry and was willing to follow it at all costs.

#### So now what?

Currently, Sara is waiting to register in a university program that ultimately will lead to a degree in law. In the meantime, she's joined various Calgary-based groups that work with those involved in the sex trade. CHILL (Christ Heals in Low Lights) is a group of young people who come alongside exploited and vulnerable women, providing support and education. She is planning a youth event in our church to educate and raise awareness of sex trafficking in Calgary.

Jessica and Sara also plan to join The Walk, a group of prayer focused believers that walk the stroll on Friday nights in downtown Calgary, with the intent to build relationships of trust and caring with those involved in the sex industry.

Jessica struggles to make ends meet every month, and the student loans are mounting. Still, she counts this new

direction as a huge blessing. To not follow is to waste the gifts God has placed in her heart.

Both Jessica and Sara are learning and growing as God continues to lead them on the paths He has set in front of them. If the road ahead sometimes feels daunting and overwhelming, Jessica is reminded that God's light doesn't illuminate the complete journey, but rather, like a candle, provides just enough for the next step. Jessica and Sara heard the call and now, in trust, they follow.

"Everyone's story matters and that's a really exciting thing!"

eet Mike Lang, a born adventurer whose passion flourishes in the great outdoors. He and his wife Bonnie were guides for wilderness ministry for youth, leading groups through adventures like rock climbing, rafting, and kayaking. At the age of 25, Mike was diagnosed with cancer and felt abruptly torn away from the path he thought he was meant to be on. It just didn't seem fair.

One night, half-way through his chemotherapy treatment, he lay awake alone on the floor in his parents' basement, completely frustrated and confused with God. It was the lowest point in his life; he just couldn't understand why this was happening to him. In that moment he felt a sudden sense of calm peace he would never forget. As Mike explained, "it was that peace that the Bible talks about – the peace that surpasses understanding - that came over me." Mike realized despite his circumstances God still had plans for his life.

That realization was a big turning point; Mike changed his perspective and started asking, "What does God have for me through cancer?" This led Mike and Bonnie to start Survive & Thrive, leading adventure trips with young adult cancer survivors and documenting them through film. "These trips have been absolutely incredible for everyone," says Mike. They have completed 17 expeditions over the past 8 years and almost 300 young adult cancer survivors have come on the journey with them. These films and experiences led him to help start cancer survivorship programs at Alberta Health Services. Over the last 5 years Mike has impacted thousands by planning and facilitating cancer survivorship education events was well as completed his master's in Health Services Research, and is pursuing his PhD, focusing on Storytelling in Health Care.

One of the greatest and most unexpected lessons revealed to Mike was the importance of sharing authentic stories that teach us how to live a meaningful life. Health care focuses heavily on empirical facts and Mike wants to restore and highlight the wisdom we can glean from sharing and listening deeply to each other's stories. Through story sharing, Mike and his wife are able to talk about their faith. "Most people we connect with aren't Christians but because we value their story, they want to know

ours also. And our story just happens to include redemption through Christ."

For Mike and Bonnie, the evening campfire on their adventure trips becomes a level playing field where everyone's story matters. When everyone's story matters, you can get to the deeper level of relationships where authenticity exists. Here is where people are willing to listen to a story of a Christian and how God has changed their life.

"There are no experts around the campfire, no one needs to have life all figured out. All that we ask of people is to listen deeply to each other's story and glean the wisdom it has for us." Mike and Bonnie have been able to share their own story with hundreds of people who actually want to hear what they have to say.

That pivotal moment of overwhelming peace in the basement allowed Mike to embrace the questions in his life and be patient for answers. Mike and Bonnie talk a lot with young adults about what kind of story they are living. "I want to live a good story, but for that to happen I realize there needs to be conflict and struggle in my life or else it's not an interesting story." With every trial, every celebration, and through unclear and wandering chapters, God is writing a great story in our lives. Trust in the Great Author to make your story an amazing one. •

#### INTRODUCTION. LITERALLY.

Six months ago, Tiffany was a member of the Global Impact Team and I was working as the administrator for SHARE Ministries (which includes Global Impact) at FAC. God was beginning to stir a desire in our hearts to see young adults involved in missions. Meanwhile, Pastor Craig (Global Impact Pastor) was given that same vision for FAC ... so he introduced us and encouraged us to move forward. When we met, we had no idea where to begin and in all honesty, we didn't feel capable of the task. Our church was large and we didn't know of many young adults outside of our small groups. How could God use us?

#### TRAINING.

Then, we were given the opportunity to attend an Envision Summit – a week-long leadership conference designed for young influencers. Roughly 50 young adults gathered, from a variety of cultures, locations, and professions, but with a common aspiration. We wanted to become the hands and feet of Jesus Christ in our everyday context, no matter what that context looks like!

Our week at the Summit was an opportunity to deepen our faith and learn what it takes to be leaders in our millennial generation. We were challenged to be authentic and reminded of the importance of cultivating genuine relationships in community. We were encouraged to apply, not rein in, our passions towards the kingdom of God. We were mentored as young leaders and inspired by each other. And finally, we were reminded of the importance of prayer – and witnessed our prayers being used in powerful ways. God used this training to unify and confirm our desire and passion to see an authentic community of young believers step up at FAC. We were full of inspiration and armed with a fresh perspective, ready to return to Calgary to make an impact.

But God was just getting started. We felt Him calling us to pray for other young leaders in our FAC community. So we waited and prayed that God would stir a desire for missions in other young leaders. It was – and still is – challenging. God has continued to work in our hearts, to shape us into people who rely fully on Him. He is teaching us that this is His task to accomplish, not ours.

#### GROWTH.

Since we began to pray, God has brought forth other young leaders to join us. We are hearing more and more names of people who are being called to make a difference in Calgary. God is amazing! These are people we've never met, but God is already



working! He is on the move in our church and we are so excited to see where He leads.

Looking forward, our goal is to be a platform that inspires, equips, and empowers our generation to pursue God's calling in their lives. We want to make faith our lifestyle. We want to use our lives as a witness; to use our words to encourage and share; and to use our strengths and passions for God in our communities. We want to be an authentic community that challenges and grows with each other.

This is an unfinished story. We want this story to grow; we want others to join in and help write this ending.

Ito and Jennifer Avilés worked for more than ten years with YWAM (Youth With A Mission), based in Argentina, discipling and preparing young people in for ministry and missions. Then God began to call them to move to Canada, and during this time they were praying for God's direction and confirmation. God didn't give specific details of His calling, but the time came to obey ... and just like that, in August of 2016, they moved to Canada with their two small children, leaving behind the comfortable and stable life they had in Argentina to face a situation of unemployment and uncertainty as they wait for the doors that God will open to fulfill the purpose they've been called towards ...

#### LUZ: How did this calling start and how did you know that Canada was the place that God would send you?

**TITO:** Years ago, God spoke to both of us at different times in different ways. On one hand, He spoke to my wife that she would one day return to Canada. At that time, I didn't want to leave my culture and language and didn't think too much of it. Later on, at a conference, God put a burden on my heart for the youth of North America and especially of Canada, so we started to pray and wait for confirmation from the Lord. That's how we, seven years later, are here today in Calgary.

#### LUZ: Why did it take so long to obey God's calling?

TITO: Esperar el tiempo de Dios para obedecer su llamado es lo más importante. (Waiting on God's timing to obey His calling is the most important thing.) One of the things we asked the Lord was for the confirmation of His timing, because when we make decisions based on our own rationale, we can make mistakes. We believe that this is God's timing. The last time we came and worked with youth in Calgary, the Lord really grew the passion in my heart for the youth here. At the same time, our leaders in Argentina – who supported us in prayer throughout this whole process, though they didn't really want us to be here – one day said to us, "We think it's time to start walking towards your calling."

**JENNIFER:** It's important to wait for the confirmation of God's specific timing. The nearly seven years that we waited was a time of prayer and a process where God continued to work very deeply in different areas of our lives, which helped us to grow as individuals and in our marriage, and really strengthened our trust in Him.

#### LUZ: What are the challenges you've faced in this time?

TITO: Todo llamado de Dios viene con desafíos. (Every calling from God comes with challenges.) I think leaving behind family, friends, comfort, and language has been the most difficult part for me. The first week in Calgary, all I could do was think and compare the comfortable situation that we left behind with this situation of uncertainty – lacking a stable job – that we're living now, but one day, God spoke to me through the passage where Jesus, before going to the cross, told His disciples to pray so they wouldn't fall into temptation. So I began to pray, telling Him that I didn't want to fall into temptation and asking Him to help me and give me patience as He reveals to us His will for us in this place.

JENNIFER: The hardest part for me, aside from what my husband mentioned, is readjusting to Canadian culture; even though I am Canadian, so much of my growth, physically, mentally, and spiritually, occurred over the ten years that I lived in Argentina and now I'm living the process of culture shock. We believe that God brought us here and that He is going to open the doors that need to be opened to carry out in us the purpose that He called us to. Y lo que nos sostiene y nos mantiene firmes es saber que, sí estamos allá en Argentina o aquí en Calgary, Él es fiel (And what sustains us and keeps us steady is the knowledge that, whether we are there in Argentina or here in Canada, He is faithful.)

Just as, by faith, Abraham obeyed God's calling to the unknown to receive the promised land, it is also by faith that Tito and Jennifer have obeyed God and expect with conviction that which will be even though their eyes do not yet see it.

When you're alone in a new city, surrounded by people you don't know and trying to navigate a brand new world, how tough is it to keep faith alive? How does a student already swimming upstream in a torrent of new experiences hold onto a personal, vital relationship with Jesus?

For Caleb Klager and Caleb Geerlof, two first-year students at the University of Toronto and University of Regina respectively, moving on to post-secondary schools far from home has brought some unique opportunities – as well as challenges.

"The predominant message I got was to get connected right away," says Geerlof. "Find a church, get connected right off the bat!" Klager agrees. "We looked at a lot of churches even when I was in Grade 12, just prepping for being out here. That was a big thing we really focused on."

Finding those new communities of believers really wasn't that difficult, although it does take some persistence. For Klager, it means an hour on public transit to get to People's Church where he participates in regular services and on the rotating worship team. Geerlof is attending the Living Hope Alliance Church, has joined a small group and also lends a hand on the worship team.

While university living is totally unlike anything they've ever experienced before, both Geerlof and Klager have been blown away by the way God has kept putting opportunities in front of them. "I was so scared I'd be alone," says Klager. "But it wasn't even the first week of classes when I ran into some people in the EXACT same boat as me. We were all looking for a church, a bit

nervous, anxious to maintain our faith. Now, it's the same small group of friends regularly attending church every Sunday."

"Having people hold you accountable has always been important to me," says Geerlof. "Now that I'm in a new city, I've had to adjust what this kind of grounding looks like." Klager agrees. "Finding community hasn't been the hard part, it's more just realizing that it's going to be different and that's okay."

Different but still familiar. While locations have changed, the daily disciplines haven't. "University is incredibly different from high school," says Geerlof. "There are thousands of young adults left to their own means, making their own choices. For me, I found that setting time aside every day to reflect and ground myself in His Word is immensely helpful, helping me to honour God."

"If you don't set up time for important stuff as soon as you start, life seems to find a way to eat up all your time and set you up with other commitments," he says.

"I have a 20-minute walk to school everyday and I usually spend that time in prayer," says Klager. "I really try to invite God's presence into all the things I do. This is part of my mission field, what God has called me to do here in Toronto – sometimes I'm gigging at the back of bars or in people's basements ... No matter where I am or who I'm with, I want to bring God's Kingdom."

"Remember, God isn't restricted to the walls of our gym," he says. "Believe me when I tell you that God wants to speak to you and



be part of your life as you go through this exciting chapter. Sometimes it feels easier said than done – I get it – but never be afraid to ask for help if you need it. You don't have to do this alone."

With so much coming at them, both Geerlof and Klager value the prayers of their FAC family – for confidence and guidance as they pursue their studies, for constant reminders that God is bigger than any of their problems, and that they will have the discipline to constantly seek God's direction in their daily lives.

"I don't want to miss the plans God has for me in the city of Regina," says Geerlof. "I want the next five years to deepen my faith and build me into the person He desires me to be."

"I'm practicing for a performance," says Klager, "but I'm also striving to perfect a craft. I believe God has given me the gift of music so that I can offer it back to Him in worship. I do ministry in the Jazz Performance program."

ne of the first things you notice when you walk into Marg Baker's kitchen are the words carved into the small stone tablet lying on her kitchen island:

#### Psalm 62: 1-2

My soul finds rest in God alone; my salvation comes from Him.

He alone is my rock and my salvation; He is my fortress.

I will never be shaken.

I met Marg for the first time in her Calgary home, recovering from chemotherapy and radiation treatment following a cancer diagnosis. While her hair is thin and her legs are weakened, her eyes continue to sparkle and her voice is strong as she tells about the unexpected and miraculous journey she has traveled in her faith over the past 25 years.

I am fascinated by the clarity, wisdom and strength that emerges from those who, like Marg, have lived lives of notable challenge and struggle. How is meaning made of events that seem on the surface to be disconnected? What purpose can be found in pain and loss? How do we understand our life story through the eyes of God?

Marg's personal faith journey begins in earnest with the ending of one relationship and the beginning of another. Newly divorced and still adjusting to a new life, daily scripture readings continually spoke to her about serving widows and orphans. In answer to that call she took employment as a live-in caregiver to a 90-year old widow. Still healing from her divorce, Marg went to bed the first night in her new home and asked God, "What has happened to my life? I surrender it all to You." Looking back on those early days Marg understands now that over 8 years as a caregiver, "I learned what a true servant heart was."

Several years later Marg felt a strong calling to serve in Thailand, and

a 4-month trip turned into a lifetime commitment to abandoned and abused Thai children through the Mercy Ministries Foundation and the ChiangSaen Babies Home. Her first months in Thailand were spent grouting tile in the new nursery. Never having done construction work before, she had to learn new skills quickly while struggling with the 40°C temperatures, no electricity, and "spiders bigger than your hand." 16 years later, Mercy Ministries has grown; to date, approximately 500 children have found safety and Christian love in the Ministry orphanages. Marg is profoundly grateful to members of FAC who provide ongoing support to her children through short-term mission work, financial sponsorship, and shipments of handmade clothes from the FAC sewing groups.


Earlier this year Marg was diagnosed with cancer in a Bangkok hospital and elected to receive her treatments in Calgary where her birth children and parents reside. From the beginning of an arduous treatment program, Marg declared that "God is a great physician" and that her health issues were His open door for her to witness to hospital staff about the Word and to share stories of her Thai children. "When you have cancer, people listen to you," she explains. When asked why she thinks cancer happened to her, Marg clearly responds with "Why not me? I am the best


one to deal with cancer because I have God." Marg's treatments are now completed and her tumor is no

longer visible on her MRI. She clearly has felt the hand of God healing and guiding her through this part of her journey in faith and service to others. She now eagerly anticipates her return to Thailand and to her beloved children.

Marg now sees each chapter of her life as connected. The miraculous unfolding of her journey of faith and service began at a time when it seemed so much was lost to her. And yet in her surrender to God's unrevealed plan and her commitment to "follow God wholeheartedly and with unshakeable faith" she

has come to serve and love in ways she never imagined. •







As the study was ending for the summer, I asked Elaine the name of the person she was thinking of, believing if God had led both of us to the same woman it would be further confirmation. I was not surprised to hear it was Donna!

The next step was mine. I spent an intense weekend querying God to be sure this was His plan for me. I knew from His Word that my responsibility as a husband would be beyond my ability to fulfill apart from His equipping me, so I needed to be sure. He reminded me of how He rescued Israel from Egypt, and yet after all the signs and wonders He performed, they'd still turned back at the Promised Land. He reminded me of all the signs He'd given me over six years, and I knew I had the same choice to make.

I felt Him say, "Just pick up the phone and watch what I will do!" I made that call, and God more than abundantly fulfilled His promise – in less than two months we were engaged!

Reflecting back, Donna can see how God had also been working in her life, granting her a heart content in Him and fully surrendered to His will.
